




About the Role

During your graduate year you will have the opportunity to learn and develop your skills in a supportive environment, working closely with your preceptor, and with regular group supervision. You will gain credits towards a post-graduate diploma in mental health nursing through the NEVIL Graduate Nurse Program, and have the opportunity to apply for a part-time Post-Graduate position the following year, where you will complete your graduate diploma.

At St Vincent's consumer-focused care is based on The Strengths Model— A recovery-oriented approach to mental health services (Rapp & Goscha, 2012). You will be trained in the use of key recovery tools, and will be encouraged to develop your own creative recovery-orientated care strategies and you will work with our Lived Experience workforce.





What is required to apply

Information that will be requested upon application:

- Cover letter (one page) and upload a passport size photo
- CV (maximum two pages)
- Details of two professional referees
- Academic transcript (certified copy)
- Clinical placement reports x 2 most recent acute placements (certified copy) 1x of which must be a mental health placement

*NB Pebblepad reports do not require certification



What goes in a Cover Letter

A cover letter needs to:

- Introduce you
- Mention the job you're applying for and why the role appeals to you
- Match your skills and experiences, with the skills and experiences required by the job
- Encourage the reader to read your CV
- Use 11 point Arial
- A cover letter should not regurgitate your CV. It should state why you are a good match for the job role in, just three or four paragraphs
- It's also vital that your cover letter is tailored to each job you're going for review it every time
- Triple check your cover letter many applicants forget to change the name from the last employer they applied to
- Stress what you can do for the potential employer, not why their company would be good for your career
- It's vital that you check the letter for mistakes. Ask a friend or family member to proof read the letter before you email or post it



What goes in a Cover Letter

Minimum of 3 paragraphs:

The opening paragraph should state the job you are going for and the fact you are confident you are suited to the role. For example, "I was interested to see your advertisement seeking a new customer service consultant as I believe my skills and experience are a good fit for the role."

Paragraph two should tell the reader why he or she should be interested in you. It might read something like, "Please find a copy of my resume attached but of particular relevance is my x years experience in x and my qualifications in A,B,C."

A third paragraph could be used to highlight a career achievement or two of particular relevance to the job. The last paragraph should bring the letter to a polite close. For example, "I hope to have an opportunity to meet with you in person to discuss how I could contribute to your team.

What goes in a CV/Resume

For most of you this will be your first employment as a nurse so your CV will not be long.

If you have worked in a position that is related to the job you are applying for, make sure you have included all the relevant details of that position, even if it was voluntary.

The layout of your CV is a personal choice but does not include your student placements only work experience.

For most of you applying for this position your CV should only be 1 page.

Who do I use for a reference

Your current employer.

A reference from a registered nurse, who supervised you during your mental health placement/s.

A reference related to volunteering work.

A reference from your respective university (a lecturer).

If you have not been employed or volunteered in the past 12 months (or ever) then a 'senior' member of the community - but not a family member.

Go to the people you want to use as referees, and ask in person if they are happy to provide a reference. Be prepared and put your best foot forward. Ask them what they are likely to say about you, when they are providing a reference.



What will the interviews be like?

Given the COVID-19 situation, our interview processes are under review.

We may conduct our interviews will be via phone and/or video link if necessary.

If your application is successful, and you are offered an interview, we will give you more information at that time.



What happens after the interviews?

We will meet to discuss the scoring completed after each interview and that will determine whose references are checked.

We always check more references than we have positions – so if your referees let you know that have provided a reference it is not an assurance of an offer.

If you are not successful, you will be notified by email or phone as soon as possible and we will discuss computer match prioritizing with you.

If you are successful, a panel member will contact you to inform you of your success by phone and will check you are still interested in the position.

A formal letter of offer will come in the form of a contract and with instructions on what you need to do.

You will then be able to safely say you are going to be a grad at St Vincent's Mental Health!
